

## **Sunnybrook Library Resource Centre - LRC:**

Welcome to the LRC, a fantastic resource shared between the two schools here at Sunnybrook Campus. The LRC makes available many resources – available not just to students, but also to staff and parents. In fact, all members of the school community can use and borrow resources from the library's extensive collection. So that this can happen effectively, we present to you the following information, in the hope that you, as a member of our School community, can take advantage of our fantastic library.

### **Using the Library:**

The library offers a broad range of resources and services. It can assist users with their learning at school and for personal reading recreation. Knowing how to use the Library effectively is vitally important in this Information Age.

### **Opening Times:**

The Library is generally open between 8.30am and 3.30pm Monday – Friday. Each class has a weekly borrowing session. Students can also borrow individually during Cross Campus Borrowing Times: 8.30-9.05am, 1.30-2.00pm, and 3.15-3.30pm.

### **Library Collection:**

The library has a considerable range of resources to meet learning and recreational needs. Books: fiction, non-fiction, big books etc.

**The Non-fiction collection is set out according to Dewey organisation.**

**Picture Books:**

These are mainly located on the fiction shelves, organised in alphabetical order according to the author's surname.

**Green dot books:**

These books are beginning chapter books and are stored with the general fiction. They have a green dot on the spine. These are kept on the general fiction shelf, and on 2 book spinners in the fiction section.

**General Fiction:**

This is where you will find all novels and some picture books written for primary level students.

**Senior Fiction:**

These fiction books are set aside for Year 7 borrowers only. They are located on the shelves in the library staff workroom. Year 7 students ask for permission to browse at these shelves. There are also **LEXILE senior fiction** book boxes located behind the circulation desk for year 7 use.

**Lexile Books:**

Lexile books are an additional home reading support program for students who have completed the Reading Recovery levelled reading materials. Students are carefully matched to books at their individual reading levels with the main focus being that students are 'reading for meaning'. The Lexile Framework for Reading is a tool that places readers and text on a common scale. For a student, a Lexile level is a measure of reading comprehension. For a book, a Lexile level is a measure of text difficulty. When a reader has the same Lexile level as a book, they are positioned to read that book with competence, confidence and control.

The Lexile Books are kept in Lexile Number Boxes, which are at the end of the fiction shelves.

**For use in the school only:**

- Reference – encyclopedias, dictionaries
- Internet Access
- CDROMs

- Videos
- CDs and Audiotapes
- Pictures

**Loans:**

Years Reception – 2....	2 books
Years 3-4....	4 books
Years 5....	5 books
Years 6-7....	6 books

Books may be borrowed for 2 weeks.

Parents and members of the community can borrow up to 6 books for a fortnight.

All loans must be returned for the school holidays.

**Overdues:**

Every 2 weeks the following reminder process occurs:

1. Fortnight Overdues – Class list of overdues is sent to the class teacher
2. Month Overdues – Individual overdue notices are given to the students
3. 6 week overdues – Individual fine payment notices are given to students

If a book is damaged, please return it to school so it can be repaired. If it is beyond repair, a bill may be sent home.

**Bookcare:**

- Keep books in a library bag
- Have a special place at home for your library books
- Have clean hands when reading
- Turn pages carefully
- Don't eat or drink when you read
- Make sure lids of drink bottles and lunch bottles are put on tightly and if possible place in a plastic bag to secure against leakage

**Rules:**

- Respect the Library as a place of learning
- Respect other people and their right to learn
- Care for the library and its resources
- Use quiet voices
- Refrain from using the library as a thoroughfare to the canteen or hall.

**Bookweek:**

This year the theme for Book Week is READiscover! In the weeks leading up to Book Week the Junior Primary classes will be considering the books short listed for a Children's Book Council of Australia prize in 2007. During Book Week classes will

**Premiers Reading Challenge:**

The Premier of South Australia, Mike Rann, is challenging all students from Reception to Year 9 to read 12 books from the start of term 1 and before 7 September, 2007.

For Reception - Year 7 students, at least 8 books must be chosen from the booklists on this website.

For Year 8 and Year 9 students at least 4 books must be chosen from the booklists. The Challenge is open to students in South Australian Government and non-Government schools as well as students undertaking home education.
